Rev. John Wagner had to have exploratory surgery again on his knee on January 8 to try to find the reason the tendon in his knee was not healing. It was discovered that he has an infection in his patellar tendon as well as in the patella and tibia (this is not the same infection he had after his first surgery back in February 2017). He is currently in the hospital receiving antibiotics intravenously. The Lord willing, they will send him home on Friday, January 12, with a PICC line inserted through which he will self-administer antibiotics for the next six weeks.

Kim Wagner was hospitalized a couple of times in December with what was thought at first to be a heart attack that turned out to be myocarditis (inflammation of the heart) and with some focal seizures (probably caused by the radiation treatments she has had). She has recovered from the myocarditis, and the seizures seem to have settled down with some adjustments to her medications. However, a recent MRI revealed a third, very small tumor on her brain. It was not surprising that another tumor was found since that is what menigiomas do—multiply; but it was, of course, disappointing. Kim will have another MRI in February that should help her doctors determine how fast the new tumor is growing and how it should be treated. The Wagners testify to God's grace and goodness even in the midst of these trials. They appreciate the prayers of God's people and the various expressions of support, especially from the people in the church.

DR. ALAN CAIRNS, emeritus Faith Free Presbyterian

The Greenville church was greatly saddened when Germaine Foster went to be with the Lord on December 23, leaving behind her husband, Scott, and their five children, Samuel, Jonathan, Megan, Catherine, and Joshua.
